Sermon Title: Series Characters of Christmas 1 – Zacharias and Elizabeth

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Scripture Reference: Luke 1:5-23

Thesis: Zacharias and Elizabeth found new Hope in the power of God;

Purpose: Today, we will learn how to experience new Hope in the power of God in our lives.

#### I) Introduction:

Scripture Reading is: Luke 1:5-23

### A) The Setting:

## 1) As we begin with the first Sunday of Advent we will start a series on the Characters of Christmas.

- (a) Our first two Characters are Zacharias or Zachariah in some translations and his wife Elizabeth.
- (b) We will also tie each of our characters with one of the Advent candles and this week we have the candle of Hope.

## 2) What is Hope?

- (a) Why do we need it?
- (b) And how do we find it?

### 3) Hope is defined in Webster's Dictionary as:

- (a) a feeling that what is wanted will happen;
- (b) a desire accompanied by expectation.

## 4) Sometimes the best way to understand something is to understand its opposite.

- (a) The opposite of Hope is Despair.
- (b) Psalm 42:5 explains Hope:
- (c) "Why, my soul, are you downcast?

Why so disturbed within me?

Put your hope in God,

for I will yet praise him,

my Savior and my God. "

#### 5) There is an old Arab parable that says:

- (a) "All sunshine and no rain makes a desert."
- (b) If you never have any down times, dark times, gloomy times in your life you'll be dried up.
- (c) You'll have no depth to yourself, no maturity. It takes good times and bad times to make a mature person.
- (d) Life is a mixture of pain and pleasure, of victory and defeat, of success and failure, of mountain tops and valleys.

## 6) Yet, without HOPE there is only despair.

- (a) There is nothing to look forward to except the daily disappointments of life.
- (b) Bills to pay with too little paycheck.
- (c) Furnace in need of repair.
- (d) A doctor's terminal diagnosis.
- (e) Divorce or job loss
- (f) There is no end to situations we must face.

## 7) But we will see that Zach and Liz were people of hope.

- (a) OR were they . . . let's see as . . .
- (b) We pick up our story here with our scripture reading for today in Luke 1:5-23.

- B) Sermon Prayer
- C) (The Hook)
  - 1) Illustration: Hope motivates<sup>2</sup>
    - (a) Hope motivates us to keep going and not give up.
    - (b) Without hope we don't want to do anything.
    - (c) There was a Peanut's cartoon once:
      - (i) Lucy and Linus were sitting in front of the television set when Lucy said to Linus, "Go get me a glass of water."
      - (ii) Linus looked surprised, "Why should I do anything for you? You never do anything for me."
      - (iii) "On your 75th birthday," Lucy promised, "I'll bake you a cake."
      - (iv) Linus got up, headed to the kitchen and said, "Life is more pleasant when you have something to look forward to."
  - 2) Hope motivates us and inspires us to keep going when life gets tough.
    - (a) When life has got you down we have to have hope that there are better days coming.
    - (b) This gives us the strength to go on and know that there is a light at the end of the tunnel.
  - 3) Illustration: CAN YOU SEE THE LAND?<sup>3</sup>
    - (a) It was a fog-shrouded morning, July 4, 1952, when a young woman named Florence Chadwick waded into the water off Catalina Island.
    - (b) She intended to swim the channel from the island to the California coast.
    - (c) Long-distance swimming was not new to her; she had been the first woman to swim the English Channel in both directions.
    - (d) The water was numbingly cold that day.
      - (i) The fog was so thick she could hardly see the boats in her party.
      - (ii) Several times sharks had to be driven away with rifle fire.
      - (iii) She swam more than 15 hours before she asked to be taken out of the water.
      - (iv) Her trainer tried to encourage her to swim on since they were so close to land, but when Florence looked, all she saw was fog; so she quit. . . only one-mile from her goal.
    - (e) Later she said, "I'm not excusing myself, but if I could have seen the land I might have made it."
      - (i) It wasn't the cold or fear or exhaustion that caused Florence Chadwick to fail.
      - (ii) It was the fog.
    - (f) Many times we too fail, not because we're afraid or because of the peer pressure or because of anything other than the fact that we lose sight of the goal.
      - (i) Maybe that's why Paul said, "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14).
      - (ii) Two months after her failure, Florence Chadwick walked off the same beach into the same channel and swam the distance, setting a new speed record, because she could see the land.
  - 4) Hope helps us to see the land.

## TS: Let us begin our study this morning by looking at . . .

- II) Body: (Key Points)
  - A) Key Point #1: The Hope of Zach and Liz
    - 1) Zachariah was a priest and it was his groups turn to serve in the temple.
      - (a) By casting lots, a sort of picking straws if you will,
      - (b) Zach was chosen to be the priest to enter the Holy of Holies to offer the prayers for his people.
    - 2) This was the Hope of every priest.
      - (a) For it only happened once in a life time for some of the priests.
      - (b) You were not guaranteed that your name would be drawn.
      - (c) Thus it was a great honor for Zachariah to be granted this privilege.
    - 3) It was while he was performing his priestly duty that the angel Gabriel appeared to him.
      - (a) Terrified that he must have done something wrong, Gabriel put his fears to rest.
      - (b) Then told him that his hope of having a son was still to come.
    - 4) This was the hope of every Jewish couple to have a male child to carry on your lineage.
      - (a) For Zachariah and Elizabeth they were now in their senior years and beyond the age of child bearing.
      - (b) And yet, with God nothing is impossible and the angel Gabriel told them that God had not forgotten them.
    - 5) Their son was to be a prophet who would prepare people for the coming of the Messiah, the Savior of their people.
      - (a) John would announce the coming of the one who could free them from the grave so that they could live eternally with God.
      - (b) Zach and Liz did not fully understand this; but John was announcing the Hope of Israel.
    - 6) But Zach did not believe the angel and thus to prove that it was true the angel Gabriel struck him mute; no voice to share the good news until it came to happen.
    - 7) Imagine their surprise when Liz became pregnant . . .
      - (a) It says she went into seclusion for the first 5 months.
      - (b) Maybe it was the morning sickness or maybe it was just being careful.
      - (c) Or just being tired from having a child late in life.

#### TS: But this would lead to ...

- B) Key Point #2: **The Hope of Israel** 
  - 1) Israel was waiting for the one who would deliver them out of bondage.
    - (a) The problem is that the Israelites took this to mean the Roman Empire.
    - (b) What they failed to realize is that there was a much more formidable enemy.
  - 2) That enemy was SIN which kept them from a real relationship with God.
    - (a) Because of Adam and Eve we are all born sinners and in need of a Savior.
    - (b) But we are in need of one who could forgive our sins and set us free from its bondage and sentence of death.
  - 3) The Romans could only end this life;
    - (a) But SIN was keeping them from the life eternal which is the life after this one.
    - (b) SIN separates us from our Holy God.
    - (c) The Mosaic covenant says that in order to be acceptable to God we had to be perfect without sin.
    - (d) God gave them the Ten Commandments, (only Ten) that they had to keep.
    - (e) Yet, this only served to show that they and we are incapable of keeping them perfectly.
  - 4) Therefore, there was a need for one who could rescue us from SIN.

- (a) This was the Hope of Israel.
- (b) To be set free from that which is really the problem.
- 5) The problem with the Israelites is that like us many, then did not understand the extent of their need.
  - (a) They only thought that if God would set them free from their earthly oppressors,
  - (b) That they would be able to have the relationship with God as His people did before.
- 6) They should have studied their history a little more as it only showed that time and again when they had peace in their land they went astray.
  - (a) They needed more than rules to live by.
  - (b) They needed one who could come and dwell within them to help them do what is right.
  - (c) One who would transform them into the likeness of God.

#### TS: And this leads us to . . .

- C) Key Point #3: **Jesus, Where Our Hope is Found** 
  - 1) Most people understand hope as wishful thinking, as in "I hope something will happen;" this is not what the Bible means by hope.4
    - (a) The biblical definition of *hope* is "confident expectation."
    - (b) Hope is a firm assurance regarding things that are unclear and unknown (Romans 8:24-25; Hebrews 11:1,7).
    - (c) Hope is a fundamental component of the life of the righteous (Proverbs 23:18).
    - (d) Without hope, life loses its meaning (<u>Lamentations 3:18; Job 7:6</u>) and in death there is no hope (<u>Isaiah 38:18; Job 17:15</u>).
    - (e) The righteous who trust or put their hope in God will be helped (<u>Psalm 28:7</u>), and they will not be confounded, put to shame, or disappointed (<u>Isaiah 49:23</u>).
    - (f) The righteous, who have this trustful hope in God, have a general confidence in God's protection and help (<u>Jeremiah 29:11</u>) and are free from fear and anxiety (<u>Psalm 46:2-3</u>).
  - 2) The New Testament idea of hope is the recognition that in Christ is found the fulfillment of the Old Testament promises (<u>Matthew 12:21</u>, <u>1 Peter 1:3</u>).
    - (a) Christian hope is rooted in faith in the divine salvation in Christ (Galatians 5:5).
    - (b) Hope of Christians is brought into being through the presence of the promised Holy Spirit (Romans 8:24-25).
    - (c) It is the future hope of the resurrection of the dead (Acts 23:6), the promises given to Israel (Acts 26:6-7), the redemption of the body and of the whole creation (Romans 8:23-25), eternal glory (Colossians 1:27), eternal life and the inheritance of the saints (Titus 3:5-7), the return of Christ (Titus 2:11-14), transformation into the likeness of Christ (1 John 3:2-3), the salvation of God (1 Timothy 4:10) or simply Christ Himself (1 Timothy 1:1).
  - 3) The certainty of this blessed future is guaranteed through the indwelling of the Spirit (Romans 8:23-25), Christ in us (Colossians 1:27), and the resurrection of Christ (Acts 2:26).
    - (a) Hope is produced by endurance through suffering (Romans 5:2-5) and is the inspiration behind endurance (1 Thessalonians 1:3 Hebrews 6:11).
    - (b) Those who hope in Christ will see Christ exalted in life and in death (Philippians 1:20).
    - (c) Trustworthy promises from God give us hope (<u>Hebrews 6:18-19</u>), and we may boast in this hope (<u>Hebrews 3:6</u>) and exhibit great boldness in our faith (<u>2</u> <u>Corinthians 3:12</u>).
    - (d) By contrast, those who do not place their trust in God are said to be without hope (<u>Ephesians 2:12, 1 Thessalonians 4:13</u>).

- 4) Along with faith and love, hope is an enduring virtue of the Christian life ( $\frac{1}{\text{Corinthians } 13:13}$ ), and love springs from hope ( $\frac{\text{Colossians } 1:4-5}{\text{Colossians } 1:4-5}$ ).
  - (a) Hope produces joy and peace in believers through the power of the Spirit (Romans 12:12;15:13).
  - (b) Paul attributes his calling to be an apostle to the hope of eternal glory ( $\frac{\text{Titus 1:1-}}{2}$ ).
  - (c) Hope in the return of Christ is the basis for believers to purify themselves in this life (Titus 2:11-14, 1 John 3:3).

## III) Conclusion (Life Application)

## A) I know I just went through a lot of stuff

- 1) But if you want to learn more go to our Church Website and read this message again and look up all the scripture references.
- 2) In fact, just doing a word study on the word "HOPE" will lead you to an eye opening understanding that Jesus is our ONLY Hope.

## B) Do you have a steadfast unshakable hope in God?

- 1) Hope not only opens the door to receive a touch from God, hope also moves you through the door.
- 2) Like Linus, when you have hope you're willing to get up and do something.
- C) Jesus is our Hope for He provided a way for us to have all our sins forgiven.
  - 1) But we have to ask Him to be the Lord, the BOSS of our life.
  - 2) We have to be willing to admit that we are sinners.
- D) For God's word teaches us that "All have sinned and fall short of the Glory of God." (Romans 3:23)
  - 1) To get right with God is to put our HOPE in Him.
  - 2) Not "I sure hope this happens." but with the promise of God that God will lead us home.

# E) There is a popular Hymn by the name of "The Solid Rock"; the first and last verses say it all.

- 1) My Hope is built on nothing less than Jesus blood and righteousness.
  - (a) I dare not trust the sweetest frame, but wholly lean on Jesus name.
  - (b) On Christ, the solid rock I stand, All other ground is sinking sand.
- 2) When He shall come with trumpet sound, O may I then in Him be found.
  - (a) Dressed in His righteousness alone, faultless to stand before the throne.
  - (b) On Christ, the solid rock I stand, All other ground is sinking sand.
- 3) Have you placed your hope in Jesus?
  - (a) Like the Psalmist says, "Put your Hope in God."
  - (b) Jesus will never fail you.
